PROGRAMS

PAACS AT HARPUR MEMORIAL **HOSPITAL IN EGYPT**

PAACS' only surgical residency in North Africa began at Harpur Memorial Hospital in Menouf, Egypt, in 2014 with the goal of training greatly-needed surgeons for the Christian hospitals in the Middle East and North Africa.

This program was launched by Dr. David Thompson and Dr. Sherif Hanna and has four graduates all serving in Egypt. Two additional surgeons will graduate this year. Dr. Randall Owen is the acting program director of the five-year surgical residency. Short-term general and sub-specialty surgeons are welcome and are needed to teach in the PAACS program. They would be a valuable asset and would be blessed by their time at Harpur with the residents.

Harpur Memorial Hospital was founded by Dr. Frank Harpur, a missionary physician from Ireland who sailed up the Nile River into the Delta. His boat served as a floating hospital receiving patients and treating them both physically and spiritually. In 1910, he opened a permanent hospital in Menouf, and since then under the leadership of the Anglican Diocese of Egypt, it has continued to grow and develop. In 2014, a sister hospital, Harpur Sadat, was opened in Sadat City, a newer city developing in the desert between Cairo and Alexandria, one with numerous industries and growing infrastructure and employing many Egyptians.


In addition, the entire hospital staff had the privilege of attending a retreat which gave Egyptian and ex-pat families the opportunity to spend quality time together. This fall, there will be a retreat for all the doctors serving at both hospitals in all specialties. It will be another opportunity for all the doctors to deepen their relationship with God and with each other and to strengthen their call to the mission of the hospital.

Many other developments at Harpur have been stimulated by the development of the surgical residency. Under the leadership of Becky Thompson, the nursing school was established. There are now many well-trained nurses to serve at Harpur and at other hospitals. Harpur now has a residency in internal medicine known as CAPPS, which is also functioning very well, and there is vision for adding a residency in pediatrics.

All of the growth has stimulated additional developments. Dr. Ian Frankish has established a well-equipped neonatal intensive care unit. He is also leading in the construction of a pediatric department as part of the new hospital building. There are also plans for a new surgery suite and operating rooms.

Please pray for the surgical residency at Harpur as it trains additional surgeons for Christian hospitals in Egypt and in North Africa and the Middle East and pray for Harpur Menouf and Harpur Sadat as they seek to work together to fulfill the mission God has given them, "to strive to be a distinguished place of holistic healing and a beacon of light to all for God's glory." Their prayer is that "with God's help they will offer loving healthcare and hope to all people."

PAACS graduates are serving in Harpur Menouf and Harpur Sadat. Recently, Dr. Owen and his wife led a spiritual life retreat for all the surgical residents, their spouses, and their children. It was a wonderful time of fellowship in which relationships with each other could deepen, and they as a department could seek God's presence and guidance.

WORK IS NOT A FOUR LETTER WORD

The title of this month's entry derives from a PowerPoint slide in my welcome and introduction of medical students to their surgical clerkship.

The word "surgery" derives from the Greek: ceir (cheir = hand) and ergon (ergon = work). Note the discipline of ergonomics, the unit of work, an erg, which equals a dyne-cm, and the French word for surgeon, chirurgien. I ask the students and trainees: "How do you define "surgeon"? Often, they comment on technical procedures, hands-on, like to operate, etc. After their responses I share my definition: "A surgeon is a physician who can operate, when it's indicated, and in the better interest of the patient." We do not operate because it is fun, pays the rent, or because of the RANDO criteria: Resident Ain't Never Done One. As my orthopedic surgeon attending counselled his residents in the mid-1960s: "There ain't no condition that can't be made worse by an operation." One must not just focus on the "hands" part of surgery. Judgement, consideration of the patient's physiologic reserve, co-morbidities, nutritional status, patient's preferences, etc. all enter into whether or not to recommend an operation. Thus, the word "surgery" does not designate a procedure or a place. We do not take a patient to "surgery and "surgerize" them. We perform operations or procedures usually in an operating room or theatre.

On another front, one at times hears that "work" is a curse, ensuing from the "Fall," Adam and Eve's partaking of the forbidden fruit in the garden of Eden. Prof. Joe Calloway, an Old Testament scholar and renowned archaeologist at the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in the USA, taught that man was assigned work **before** the "Fall". Gen 2:15 in the RSV: "The Lord God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to till it and keep it." Thus, man was given tasks - to till and to keep which constitute work. Subsequently, the work was more difficult. Gen 3:17-19 states that the work would be more laborious secondary to the ground being cursed, etc. plus comments about "the sweat of your face."

A key book for me is A Diary of Private Prayer by John Baillie.

In his entry for the morning of the 7th he prays for:

"The overworked, who have no joy of leisure: The unemployed, who have no joy of labour:"

We sing the hymn "Work for The Night is Coming" which enjoins us to follow Jesus's job description in the Logos Hymn of John 1 "to make God known." Jesus also had a three-part job description recorded in Matthew 4:23: teaching, preaching, healing.

Globally, but notably in sub-Saharan Africa, we have two major work-related challenges: unemployment and underemployment. Those of us who have meaningful work should be grateful; we are among the fortunate, the blessed.

I close with several quotes:

- Dr. Charles Mayo, a co-founder of the Mayo Clinic, had a red-and-black sign hanging in his office which read: "There's no fun like work."
- My grandfather, a dirt farmer in Middle Tennessee who never completed high school, taught me: "Nobody ever drowned in sweat."
- Colossians 3:23-24 encourages us "to work as unto the Lord".
- I contend that work is a blessing. Work is a gift.

STORIES FROM THE ROAD

I have been involved with PAACS since my first trip to Gabon in 2005. I spent two weeks helping train Dr. Thompson's surgical residents in ENT surgical care during that time. That visit opened my eyes to the need to train African surgeons to take care of all the surgical needs in Africa regardless of specialty. Rural surgeons in Africa take care of the skin and all its contents.



Over the last 19 years, I have made numerous trips to serve as a visiting faculty surgeon at many of the PAACS hospitals throughout East and West Africa. It has been a special opportunity to teach ENT surgical care while getting to know the residents' stories, their families, and their dreams. I have watched many of these residents graduate, establish their own mission practices, and continue the cycle of training more surgeons in their home countries. Becoming involved in the administration of these PAACS programs by serving on the Board of Directors for over 15 years has also been an honor. It has been a privilege to be part of PAACS resident education conferences, PAACS faculty development conferences, the opening of new PAACS programs, and graduation festivities over the years.

Along the way, I have met many other otolaryngologists who have served with PAACS. James Smith, MD, was integral in the genesis of PAACS over 25 years ago and continues to serve in multiple capacities with PAACS today. Wayne M. Koch, MD, started the first PAACS head and neck surgical fellowship at Mbingo Hospital in Cameroon and has multiple fellows serving as head and neck surgeons today throughout the continent. Nathaniel Peterson, MD, is an otolaryngologist-head and neck surgeon serving at Kijabe Hospital alongside Bryce R. Noblitt, MD, and they are currently in the process of starting a second PAACS head and neck fellowship in Kenya. Chege Macharia, MBChB, FCS, Dr. Koch's first head and neck fellow, is also part of the ENT team at Kijabe Hospital where he also serves as the CEO of the hospital. Numerous



other otolaryngologists, including Alan Johnson, MD, Michael Frederick Spafford, MD, and Jewel D. Greywoode, MD, have also volunteered as teaching faculty at PAACS programs across Africa and serve on the PAACS Head and Neck Council, which helps govern the PAACS head and neck fellowships. ONE-YEAR GLOBAL SURGERY FELLOWSHIP - LLU AND MALAMULO ADVENTIST HOSPITAL



The Loma Linda University Department of Surgery in Loma Linda, California has a one year non-ACGME accredited clinically focused Global Surgery Fellowship (GSF) and is looking to find its next fellow to start August 1, 2025. The goal of the Global Surgery Fellowship is to prepare American-trained general surgeons to be competent and capable of performing the needed surgeries in rural, low-resource environments, and low- and middle-income countries (LMIC). The Global Surgery Fellowship furthers the Loma Linda University Health (LLUH) goal 'to make man whole' physically, intellectually, emotionally, and spiritually by continuing Christ's healing and teaching ministry. It aims to address the overwhelming surgical needs throughout the developing world by enabling an increase in access to safe surgery globally.

In 2015, the World Health Organization recognized that the lack of access to safe surgical care results in 3x more deaths than HIV, TB, and Malaria combined and the WHO made Global Surgery a priority in public health. There are approximately five billion people around the globe who lack access to safe and affordable surgical and anesthesia care with a vast majority of those people living in the low-resource settings of LMIC. It is estimated that each year 143 million additional surgical procedures need to be done in Sub-Saharan Africa alone. The LLUH GSF will directly address surgery's indispensable part of health care in underserved areas and will positively affect the U.N. Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) by training surgeons to be capable and competent in surgery in rural, low-resource environments.

The Global Surgery Fellowship (GSF) is a one-year training program for American Board of Surgery eligible or certified general surgeons. It consists of nine months training at Loma Linda University Health (LLUH) in Loma Linda, California and three months of guidance and experience at Malamulo Adventist Hospital (MAH) in Malawi, Africa. The fellowship training at LLUH will consist of rotations and case log completion in Obstetrics, Gynecology, Urology, Orthopedics, and Trauma, as well as Anesthesia, Neurosurgery, Pediatric Surgery, ENT, Plastic Surgery, Wound Care, Dentistry, Preventative Medicine, Tropical Disease, Public Health, financial literacy for organizations, and leadership in health administration. The fellow will complete at least one research paper focusing on a topic in Global Surgery.

LUH is uniquely equipped for the GSF with its strong history of international service and its direct connection to a wide network of hospitals in low- and middle-income countries. This modus operandi of mission focus is evident in the multidisciplinary enthusiasm and support for the Department of Surgery's Global Surgery Fellowship.

The fellowship program director, Dr. Ryan Hayton has a continued interest in meeting the global needs of surgery based on their real experience in providing surgical care in low-resource environments.

Applicants must have completed an ACGME approved general surgery residency by July 31, 2025 and be American Board of Surgery certified or eligible.

11th Annual International Humanitarian Surgical Skills Course

This CME activity will help prepare the International Humanitarian volunteer for delivering surgical care in a low resource setting for treatment of common surgical and obstetric conditions. In developing and in-crisis countries, the surgical volunteer must truly be a "generalist" and able to handle an array of surgical conditions. Through a variety of techniques including skill stations and simulation, participants will familiarize themselves with several relevant procedures, as well as the essential elements of surgical safety, ethics, and cultural considerations required for such settings. Specific skill areas that will be taught are orthopedic dislocations and fracture management with traction pins and external fixation, cesarean sections, post-partum hemorrhage, obstructive uropathy, wound and burn management, hand cutting of skin grafts and basic skin flaps, emergency burr holes, hysterectomy, uterine evacuations, tendon repairs, tropical medicine for surgical diseases, and low resource anesthetic techniques.

This course is intended for physicians and advanced practice providers with pre-existing surgical/procedural skills: surgery, emergency medicine, family medicine, and OBGYN.
