MOU Signed with Kibuye Hope Hospital in Burundi

In early September, the MOU was signed between PAACS and Kibuye Hope Hospital in Burundi, and the dossier was submitted to the Burundi Ministry of Higher Education for approval. Please pray that the new PAACS General Surgery program will be approved quickly so that it can begin in January 2022. COSECSA EXAMS

A total of 41 PAACS residents sat for the written exams of COSECSA. Twenty-three residents sat for the MCS Exam with 22 passing. The MCS Oral Examinations are scheduled for November 19-20 where 25 PAACS residents will take part.

Eighteen PAACS residents sat for the FCS Exam with 100% passing - (8) General Surgery, (6) Orthopaedic Surgery, (2) Pediatric Surgery and (2) Cardiothoracic Surgery. The oral exams are currently scheduled for December with 20 PAACS residents scheduled to sit.

PAACS BASIC SCIENCE CONFERENCE

The Brackenhurst Basic Science Conference, which was scheduled to be held next month at Brackenhurst in Kenya, has been postponed due to concerns about logistics related to travel because of COVID. This conference is an intensive educational and spiritual experience for first and second year PAACS residents. It includes fellowship and instruction on both surgical and spiritual topics. It is hoped that the meeting can be rescheduled for early 2022.

Malamulo White Coat Ceremony



The PAACS Program at Malamulo Adventist Hospital in Malawi recently welcomed two new residents, Dr. Bonya Sharon Sheryl and Dr. Mkandawire Neutron Joseph. They were inducted into the program with the traditional white coat ceremony. Dr. Sheryl is from Malawi but is ready to go anywhere the Lord will send her upon completion. Dr. Joseph is also from Malawi and is a committed Christian who dreams of becoming a Christian surgical trainer in his home country. OVERCOMING Adversity At Mbingo

There are few places on earth more beautiful than the lush valley that is home to Mbingo Baptist Hospital in the West African country of Cameroon. There is also little doubt that MBH is increasingly strategic for the future of surgical and medical training of committed Christian surgeons for Africa. It should come as no surprise that this remarkable work of God is under constant attack over the past four years. Recently the unrest seemed to be settling down, but recent incidents are again challenging the hospital's ability to remain neutral, serve the sick, continue its training programs, and live out the gospel of Christ.

Despite these difficulties, the PAACS training programs in general surgery and head and neck surgery are continuing, thanks to the truly remarkable efforts of Drs. Jim Brown, Mark Snell, Sama Akanyun, Wayne Koch, Stu Archibald, George Ngock, and Acha Evaristus. All are trusting God to protect and bless Mbingo through this crisis.

In a recent telephone interview, Dr. Jim Brown reported that Mbingo's PAACS program is facing not one, but two significant challenges: local political unrest that recently targeted the teachers at a school for Mbingo's 800 staff members (and residents), and a shortage of PAACS trainers. In a few weeks, Dr. Jim Brown and his wife Carolyn will return to Mbingo, and Mark and Yvonne Snell will head back to the U.S. for a few months.

Because of COVID and the challenges of travel, Drs. Wayne Koch and Stu Archibald are the only faculty head and neck surgeons and continue to travel to Mbingo to teach. To provide adequate supervision to the head and neck fellows, he has extended the fellowship from one year to two. Their current fellow Is Dr. Keafon Nchfor, a graduate of the Kenyetta ENT program last December, and a native of Bamenda.

To date, the Head and Neck Fellowship has trained Dr. Chege Macharia, now at Kijabe, Dr. Mesele Bogale, from Ethiopia, and Dr. Marco Faniriko, from Madagascar. Dr. Steve Kyota was also a fellow but because of regional instability was only able to complete a portion of the program.

The recent challenges Mbingo is facing are occurring at the same time as a number of remarkable achievements:

- Construction on Mbingo's own hydroelectric plant was finally completed in mid-September, after nearly twenty years of fund raising, planning, and construction. The newly functioning plant includes two dams built with local labor and materials and a German turbine and generating system. The system is already providing the hospital with enough electricity to function at capacity and may even generate enough power to sell. For the first time in decades, Mbingo's hospital and housing campus has all the stable and reliable electricity they can use!
- The hospital has also added a CT scanner to its diagnostic capabilities and a long-awaited oxygen generating plant.
- The ICU has recently been enlarged and upgraded.
- All of Mbingo's training programs, including the two PAACS programs, internal medicine training program, and nursing school are now part of a new "Baptist Institute of Health Services".
- Mbingo Baptist Hospital is on track to develop a department of radiation oncology, a first for PAACS hospitals.
- According to Dr. Jim Brown, the hospital's surgical and medical training programs are the best in the country and are having a significant impact on the quality of surgical training and health care in the nation.
- The program's first graduate, Dr. George Ngock, went on to complete a fellowship in Pediatric Surgery at Kijabe Hospital in Kenya and is currently the only pediatric surgeon in northwest Cameroon.
- Dr. Mabanza and Dr. Gerald Ekwen are among six PAACS graduates serving in Liberia and represent 50% of the general surgeons in the country!

SPIRITUAL RETREAT AT ARUSHA

In August, the Spiritual Dean, Dr. Ed Scearce went to the PAACS Program at Arusha Lutheran Medical Center (ALMC) in Tanzania to participate in their annual Spiritual Retreat. The retreat was a success and enjoyed by all. It was a time of spiritual refreshing for residents and faculty. The weekend was spent together at a retreat center nearby Arusha.

The theme for the retreat was "The Beauty of the Transformational Life". It was an in-depth study of Romans chapter 12.

The following is a brief report written by Dr. Frank Madinda, PAACS Program Director and Chief Medical Officer at the hospital.

"Behold, how good and pleasant it is when brothers dwell in unity" Psalms 133:1.

It is always a blessing to have the residents, faculty, and their families come together in one place with one purpose – to worship God. This year, despite the ongoing rage of COVID-19, we managed to have our 8th long spiritual retreat from the 13th to the 15th of August (albeit earlier than our usual December routine) led by our PAACS Spiritual Dean, Dr. Ed Scearce. We were 33 people in attendance, 16 children and 17 adults at a nearby retreat center in Arusha.

Our theme was "The Beauty of the Transformational Life" from the book of Romans, chapter 12. We learned that transformational living is a life lived by committing all we know about ourselves to all we know about God as an act of faith, and then God does the transformation. This transformation brings about beauty in our lives by living through the lens of God's grace, living for the good of others, and living out love.

We went on a hike to a nearby waterfall on Saturday afternoon to wonder at God's beautiful creative works, and later in the evening we ended the day with wonderful discussions. Such moments are crucial for our fellowship and bonding beyond the scope of work and studies.

On Monday morning, Pastor Ed blessed us once more with a seasoned word of God from Psalm 139. Later in the afternoon, together with the chaplain of ALMC, he went for patient visits in the hospital. A special thanks to all those who continually make such an event possible!
