PAACS envisions a growing number of African surgeons and related specialists living out the Gospel and ministering to the sick.


# FROM THE DESK OF THE CEO

# TWO NEW PAACS PROGRAMS APPROVED BY BOARD OF DIRECTORS

We are thrilled to share that the PAACS Board of Directors has approved two new programs that promise to significantly enhance our mission and extend our reach across Africa.

First, we are excited to announce the approval of a new General Surgery program at AIC Kapsowar Hospital in Kenya. This initiative marks a substantial expansion of our surgical training capabilities. Specifically designed for non-Kenyan residents from countries with high needs for surgical care and gospel outreach.

Secondly, we are preparing to incorporate an Obstetrics and Gynecology program from AIC Kijabe Hospital. This will be the second Ob/Gyn program under the PAACS ministry, reflecting our commitment to filling critical gaps in maternal and reproductive health. The Kijabe program is designed to equip future specialists with the skills necessary to provide life-saving care to mothers and babies, supported by PAACS's distinctive combination of professional excellence and spiritual development.





Both programs are diligently progressing through the planning stages. These initiatives represent not just an expansion of PAACS's educational offerings but also a significant step forward in our mission to spread God's love and healing throughout Africa.

### "YOU ARE WHAT YOU READ." PART 1 OF 2.

In grand rounds and conference talks to medical students, residents, and faculty, I often include a section of recommended books and state: "Some folks say, 'You are what you eat;' I counter: 'You are what you read.""

The most important book I have read this year, not counting the Bible and various devotional books, is *From Strength to Strength – Finding Success, Happiness, and Deep Purpose in the Second Half of Life* by Arthur C. Brooks (Portfolio/Penguin, 2022), which a close friend recommended.

Instead of a formal book review so as not to tell you key takeaways of this book, I will share sentences and quotes I discovered and underlined in my paper copy.

Arthur C. Brooks, author of twelve books, is a Professor at the Harvard Kennedy School and the Harvard Business School. Additionally, he is a practicing Christian, a former professional French hornist, and former president of the American Enterprise Institute, a think tank in DC.

"Here is the reality: in practically every high-skilled profession, decline sets in sometime between one's late thirties and early fifties." (p. 4)"... the most common age for great discovery is one's late thirties .... And declines dramatically through one's forties, fifties, and sixties." (p. 5) "Decline is unavoidable. Period." (p. 23)

Quoting Cattell, Brooks distinguishes fluid intelligence vs.crystallized intelligence ... (which) "tends to increase with age through one's forties, fifties, and sixties—and does not diminish until late in life if at all." "When you are young, you have raw smarts; when you are old, you have wisdom." (p. 26-27)

"Remember, every change of circumstances is a chance to learn, grow, and create value... Devote the back half of your life to serving others with your wisdom. Get old sharing the things you believe are most important." (p. 40)

"No one is ever famous enough, rich enough, or powerful enough. 'Wealth is like sea-water, the more we drink, the thirstier we become, and the same is true of fame--that's philosopher Arthur Schopenhauer, writing in 1851..." (p. 59)

Brooks argues that "Satisfaction" does not mean "Getting what you want... Continually getting what you want... Continually having more than others..." Rather the quotient "Satisfaction = What you have/what you want." (p. 76-86)

Brooks asks: "What is my why?" Purpose? "... the forces ... that are for most responsible for ... happiness: my faith; my family; my friendships; the work I am doing that is inherently satisfying, meaningful, and that serves others." (p. 91)


"In his book *The Road to Character* ... David Brooks distinguishes between 'resume virtues' and 'eulogy virtues.' Resume virtues are professional and oriented toward earthly success. They require comparison with others. Eulogy virtues are ethical and spiritual and require no comparison." (p. 102-103)

George Vaillant of the Harvard Study of Adult Development (a longitudinal study launched in 1938) concluded: "... the single most important trait of Happy-Well elders is healthy relationships... Happiness is love. Full stop." (p. 117)

When one of Brooks's sons in high school asked the author "the three things I really wanted for him?" Brooks replied "Honesty, compassion, and faith." (p. 140)

"Mountains of research show that religious and spiritual adults are generally happier and generally suffer less depression than those that have no faith." (p. 154)

but in your hearts honor Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared ...to give a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect, 1 Peter 3:15

This verse exhorts us to always be prepared to share the hope of the gospel with others. That may not always seem to be convenient. Especially for those of us who work within the medical profession. However, God has given us a wonderful opportunity to share the hope of Christ with those we serve through medicine.

This is one of the primary PAACS goals. Not only providing excellent medical care but attending to the spiritual needs of those God puts in our sphere of influence. In an effort to prepare all of our residents and faculty, we have begun to partner with ICMDA (International Christian Medical and Dental Association) in equipping all to share the gospel. It is called the Saline Process of evangelism.

The Saline Process course is designed to help Christian health professionals become more comfortable practicing in a way that addresses the needs of the whole person. There is a mixture of teaching and small group discussion, and the focus is on learning practical skills.

It provides us an accepted way of engaging both in a patient's medical history and their spiritual history. It is very natural and often leads to many opportunities for deeper spiritual conversations.

PAACS has already provided this training at the Brackenhurst conferences for many of our faculty. Several of our sites have also provided training for residents and faculty. In this next year it's our goal to do at least two on-site trainings which would include the entire PAACS team for that location.
