Loma Linda University Site Visits to ALMC, Soddo, and CURE-Ethiopia

The last 'every five-year cycle' site visits took place in 2016. After a Covid delay over the last few years, Loma Linda University (LLU), as an accrediting body for PAACS training sites, was able to restart these accreditation site visits from October 30 – November 6, 2022. An LLU team under the leadership of Dr. Mark Reeves with Dr. Martin Rosenthal and Dr. Jana Davis, evaluated Arusha Lutheran Medical Centre (ALMC), Soddo Christian Hospital (SCH), and CURE-Ethiopia. Fortunately, the international travel was uneventful and the team, including PAACS Executive Vice President Keir Thelander, arrived at ALMC October 31.

As is the routine of these visits, Tuesday, November 1, began with a meeting with administration, surgical leadership, and the team, followed by a tour of the hospital, wrapping up before lunch with a discussion

with the residents. After lunch, a meeting with the Program Director and Assistant Program Director team added to the information provided about the program and its function. Overall, the program has grown much since the last visit and seems to be on a positive trajectory.

The next morning included a meeting with ALMC orthopaedic surgeons and the Director of Clinical Services, PAACS Program Director Dr. Frank Madinda, exploring the possibility of commencing a PAACS orthopaedic training program at ALMC. The team then headed to the airport to travel to Addis where the night was spent before visiting CURE-Ethiopia the next morning. One of the PAACS/SCH/CURE trainees in orthopaedics was on rotation at CURE, allowing the team the chance to meet with Dr. Nigusu as well as tour the facility with Program Director Dr. Tim Nunn. The facility has added buildings and has a large expansion planned that will better care for disabled children while seeking to restore them physically.

The afternoon of November 3rd, the team traveled to Hawassa and was received by PAACS General Surgery Program Director Dr. Tim Love, who drove the team through a drizzle, weaving through people and animal carts, finally arriving after dark at Soddo Christian Hospital. This program was discovered to have grown significantly and is on much more stable footing than the last site visit. The administration is obviously supportive of both the General Surgery and Orthopaedic training programs. Having added more housing for trainees as well as almost completing a large OR expansion, this program has had similar improvements in the academic strength of the program. Dr. Tim Love shares the program leadership with Chief of Surgery and previous PAACS Program Director Dr. David Jeffcoach and PAACS Graduate Dr. Gezahegn Tilahun.

On departure, we made a brief visit to the government hospital in Hawassa, meeting with the Chief of Surgery and quickly touring the facility before flying back to Addis and then on to the United States. The visits went well with overall positive initial reports about all three programs (General Surgery ALMC and Soddo and Orthopaedics at Soddo/CURE) from the LLU team. **Please pray for continued growth and development of these programs to maximize training and discipleship.**

Travel Fellowship Update: Dr. Jean Faya Yaradouno

PAACS welcomed its first Graduate Travel Fellow to the U.S. this fall. The Alumni Committee selected Dr. Jean Faya Yaradouno, a 2010 Bongolo Hospital surgical training program graduate, as the first recipient of the newly organized travel fellowship. As a PAACS graduate surgeon, Dr. Yaradouno returned to his home country of Guinea, where he has served a population of over 300,000 for the last twelve years at Hope Clinic. He remains the only trained surgeon for this hospital, region, and receives surgical referrals from neighboring countries.

The PAACS Graduate Travel Fellowship was a combination of medical education and fundraising opportunities. From mid-October through mid-November, Dr. Yaradouno visited five states, seven cities, four healthcare systems (hospitals/ universities), the PAACS Fall Board of Directors Meeting, and the Global Missions Health Conference.

We would like to thank hosts Dr. Ken Rutledge, Dr. Jana Davis, Dr. Kevin El-Hayek, Dr. Donna Spratt, Dr. Kelly Agnew, and Dr. Barry Inabnet for providing incredible observation and learning opportunities in their respective healthcare systems. THE GLOBAL MISSIONS HEALTH CONFERENCE: REFLECTIONS, REMINDERS, CHALLENGES

For over two decades starting in 1996, the Southeast Christian Church's Blankenbaker Campus in Louisville, Kentucky, has hosted a Missions Conference each November. This year's gathering was my third. Last year, I was on a panel with PAACS colleague Jim Smith and others. This year, I attended mostly to be available to meet and talk with potential PAACS faculty and volunteers.

PAACS had a significant presence including Dr. Jean Faya Yaradouno, a PAACS graduate serving in Guinea. Several of us were always available at the PAACS booth to inform attendees about PAACS, our mission, our current and future endeavors. I attended informative breakout sessions and other presentations when not at the PAACS booth.

Dr. Carol Spears, former Tenwek General Surgery Program Director, now in the Middle East, delivered the Plenary #3 address entitled: "God of the Desert: Finding Hope and Beauty in Our Trials."

Dr. Jim Smith led a breakout session on "Transitioning from Expatriate to National Leadership: Past, Present, and Future."

PAACS Board Member Dr. Rebekah Naylor shared twice on "Women on Mission."

Dr. Keir Thelander hosted a PAACS dinner / update session.

Burton Lee, affiliated with AIC Kijabe and now at the NIH, presented on clinical ethics, evidence-based medicine, and supporting global critical care in low-middle-income countries through medical education.

Dr. Mark Topazian, a gastroenterologist based in Addis Ababa with SIM and also on faculty at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, spoke on "Spirit-

-uality and Health." For a decade, Mark has worked with Tenwek Program Director Dr. Michael Mwachiro on esophageal cancer research and is a major player as we seek to launch a Surgical Endoscopy fellowship at Tenwek and with COSECSA. Using stories, Mark shared of three missionaries who made significant contributions to medical knowledge and progress in a very interactive address entitled: "Biomedical Research and Faith-Based Healthcare." Some notes from Dr. Topazian's presentation on research follow.

- Science relates to discovering new knowledge while medicine addresses the care of patients.
- Denis Burkitt, born in 1911, went to Uganda in 1946 with the British Colonial Service. He kept good records and was curious. In 1957, noting two children with jaw tumors which he originally labeled "sarcoma," he asked why. He ploughed through records, noting where the children lived, the altitude of their villages and...

discovered and described a "lymphoma belt." In 1961, he met Michael Epstein at a conference and provided tissue for Epstein and his colleague Barr to study. Subsequently, the Epstein-Barr virus and its relation to Burkitt's lymphoma was described.

- Dr. Tom Thatcher was a missionary family medicine / general practitioner in northern Nigeria working at a cottage hospital in community health evangelism. He subsequently launched the Family Medicine residency program at the Jos University Teaching Hospital and taught his residents research methods and statistics. They saw many children with genu valgum, genu varum, and "windswept deformity" who carried the diagnosis of rickets. But rickets traditionally was felt secondary to a deficiency of vitamin D. These children spent much of the time in the sun, the boys shirtless. They were exposed to abundant sunshine. He was curious. He took blood samples for his colleague Phil Fisher who ran Vitamin D levels on the specimens and noted the levels were in the normal range. However, digging deeper, they noted that the calcium levels were below normal. The New England Journal of Medicine published this major discovery related to nutrition and endocrinology in 1999.
- Debbie Coats, a family nurse practitioner in rural Cambodia, worked in a village clinic with limited resources and no electric grid. She noted tachypnea in infants who often subsequently died. She was curious and talked with the mothers in what was a "verbal autopsy." As she encountered more children with dyspnea and having nothing but "a stethoscope and a brain," she discovered that the symptomatic children were thiamine (vitamin B1) deficient and had beriberi. In time, storing blood samples in a solar-powered refrigerator and utilizing a portable ultrasound for cardiac echo evaluation, she learned these children had congestive heart failure. In time, with support from the Gates Foundation funding, a treatment regimen was discovered to reverse and prevent these heretofore unnecessary deaths.

As Dr. Steve Bickler, a University of California San Diego pediatric surgeon who worked in Gambia and now in Mozambique, encourages: ABCD = Always Be Collecting Data. Ask "Why?" Keep good records. Build a team and include a research coordinator. The "research culture" differs from the "clinical culture." Research teams are flat and non-hierarchical. Practice research ethics. Obtain consent for studies from your local Ethics Committee or Institutional Research Board. Meet regularly. In clinical care, patients come to us physicians for help; in research, we go to the patients to ask them for help.
