## **PAACS BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING**

On Friday, October 30, 2020, PAACS held its Fall Board of Directors meeting. The PAACS Board of Directors and leadership were unable to meet face-to-face once again because of the restrictions associated with the COVID-19 pandemic. Regardless, we are grateful that we were able all able to meet virtually through Zoom.

There were over 115 participants in the Open-Session portion of the meeting. The audience included the PAACS Board of Directors, leadership, as well as guests. We had participants from the United States, Canada and Africa. We were especially happy to welcome several of our PAACS faculty joining us from around the world.

Dr. Thomas Robey, PAACS Chairman, welcomed all participants to the Open-Session of the virtual meeting. Dr. Ed Scearce, PAACS Spiritual Dean, led off the meeting with a time of devotion and prayer. Following this time, Susan Koshy, PAACS Chief Executive Officer, presented an administrative overview of the PAACS ministry. She discussed the journey forward now that we are an independent organization. She spoke about how PAACS needs to be positioned at this time to continue to be a healthy and viable organization impacting God's kingdom in Africa. Dr. Keir Thelander, PAACS Executive Vice President, discussed the future growth of PAACS programs in Africa and potential new sites being considered to be a part of PAACS. He also provided a detailed update on each of the current PAACS programs.

This year, PAACS had a number of presenters discussing a variety of topics during its Open-Session meeting. Dr. Rebekah Naylor and Dr. John Chae, both members of the PAACS Board of Directors, presented on the need for mentoring, how to mentor and their experiences in mentoring. Dr. Ken Muma, PAACS Program Director of the Pediatric Surgery Program and the Executive Director of AIC Kijabe Hospital in Kenya, provided a very honest and eye-opening discussion on the topic of "Race and Discrimination—An African Perspective". Participants of the meeting lauded Dr. Muma for his candor and thanked him for this authentic presentation on this topic. Finally, Dr. Heath Many and Dr. David Halter, both former PAACS faculty members, who are now

back in the US, provided their perspectives on being on the PAACS surgical faculty and life on the mission field. Each of these presentations provided the audience with interesting perspectives, thoughtful nuggets of wisdom and useful information. These presentations are on the PAACS website for your review.

In addition to these presentations, the PAACS Committee, Council and Investigative Task Force Chairs provided reports during the Open-Session meeting. The Chairs provided an update on the work of their groups and future actions that are being considered. Each of the Committees, Councils and Investigative Task Forces met prior to the Board meeting and did a tremendous amount work in preparation for the meeting. Thank you to all who participated and for all of the work that was accomplished.

The PAACS Open-Session of the Board meeting concluded by early afternoon and the Closed-Session was conducted with the PAACS Board and administration members only. This was the first meeting that this governing body met as an official Board of Directors after becoming an independent ministry.

During the Closed-Session of the meeting, the Board of Directors approved the minutes from the previous meeting, reviewed and accepted changes to the PAACS bylaws and board policy manual as presented by the Governance Committee. They also reviewed and accepted the PAACS audited finances as provided by the Finance Committee. These documents are available upon request.

Heath Many, previous program director at Tenwek, pointed out in his report to the Board that the role of a PD is multifaceted:

During the course of the meeting Ms. Susan Koshy, PAACS CEO, provided an update on the PAACS transition to becoming a new and independent organization. Dr. Keir Thelander, shared with the Board various issues concerning the PAACS Africa programs that require consideration. In addition, the PAACS Academic Dean's Report was presented by Dr. William Wood and the Spiritual Dean's Report was presented by Dr. Ed Scearce.

This year, for the first time during the closed-session meeting, the Board of Directors had a special presentation. Ms. Paula Goedert, an attorney with the law firm of Barnes and Thornburg, spent time with the Board discussing their duties and obligations as Board members in the new PAACS organization. It was Ms. Goedert who assisted PAACS with the transition process of becoming an independent ministry.

An election was also held during the Closed-Session meeting and the following persons were selected to the PAACS Board of Directors to serve a two-year term:

We want to particularly welcome Dr. Stephen Doane and Dr. Jacques Ebhele as new members to the PAACS Board of Directors. We are happy to have them join us and provide new perspectives, wisdom and expertise to the PAACS Board.

PAACS is in the process of reviewing its mission and vision statement along with the strategic plan. Dr. Doug Lundy is leading the charge on reviewing and revising this document. A strategic planning workgroup has been developed to make recommendations to the Board of Directors by its Spring meeting. Several other workgroups were formed based on discussions at the meeting including a workgroup to look into the relationship and obligations between PAACS and its faculty. The Board also developed a workgroup to consider and study a grievance process to adjudicate problems if presented by PAACS programs. These workgroups were initiated at this meeting and are charged with bringing recommendations to the Board by the Spring meeting.

Much was accomplished during a brief session at the Fall Board of Directors meeting. We were also able to include our PAACS family from Africa, who may not have been able to attend otherwise. # PAACS ALUMNI TRAVELING FELLOW SELECTED

PAACS is glad to announce the first recipients of the new Alumni Travel Fellowship. Dr. Jean Faya Yaradouno in Guinea was selected as the first PAACS Alumni Travel Fellow which will be for 2021. For 2022, Dr. Jack Barasa in Kenya was selected to be the Fellow.

PAACS plans to offer this fellowship annually. The purpose of the fellowship is three-fold: to provide a career-boosting opportunity for graduates, to enhance PAACS fundraising efforts with the perspective of surgeons practicing in Africa, and to facilitate greater alumni involvement in all aspects of the PAACS organization.

The fellowship will entail 3 weeks of travel to the United States. The itinerary will consist of approximately 3 cities that have both supporters of PAACS and hospitals suitable for surgery-related learning experiences tailored to the graduate's areas of interest. The graduate



will participate in academic-related activities (operative shadowing, grand rounds lectures, conferences, etc.) as well as speaking at fundraising/awareness events for PAACS. For spiritual encouragement, the fellow also will be invited to lodge in the homes of interested supporters whenever possible along the itinerary. The travel dates will be scheduled around the time of a bi-annual meeting of the PAACS Board of Directors, so that the graduate can fully participate there also.

A runner-up will be selected each year in case external constraints prevent the initial awardee from completing the fellowship. We anticipate that the runner-up will be slated as the Travel Fellow for the subsequent year. Nominations were accepted for PAACS alumni who have been in practice at least 5 years since the end of their training. All of the applicants were superb candidates and the Alumni Liaison Committee considered each application carefully.

## POST-RESIDENCY FELLOWS OF 2020

Out of 15 Post-Residency Fellows from the Samaritan's Purse World Medical Mission program, nine are going to PAACS-affiliated hospitals. Five are surgeons and will join the PAACS faculties.

Drs. Andrew and Caroline Avery will be going to Galmi Hospital in Niger. Andrew is a general surgeon and Caroline is a family medicine physician.

Drs. Brendon and Angela Esquibel, another general surgery/family medicine duo, will also be going to Galmi Hospital.

Dr. David Skavdahl, general surgeon, is taking his family to join the general surgery program at Bongolo Hospital in Gabon. Dr. Alicia Stone, obstetrics and gynecology, is also slated to join Bongolo Hospital.

Dr. Benjamin Roose, a general surgeon, will join Kibuye Hope Hospital in Burundi. A PAACS program will begin there in 2021, the Lord willing.

Dr. Jared Criswell, family medicine, will be going to Hopital Baptist Biblique in Togo. That hospital is planning to join PAACS in the next few years.

Dr. Tim DeKoninck, emergency medicine, will go to Tenwek Hospital with his family.

World Medical Mission's Post-Residency Program is a fully-funded two-year program established in 2004 to prepare young doctors and dentists called to a career in medical missions for the rigors and rewards of service in overseas hospitals. During their two-year assignment, these men and women gain valuable experience, share the love of Christ with patients, and adapt to living in a different culture. WMM/SP provides logistical and financial support while they serve alongside career medical missionaries. As of now, they have sent out over 200 physicians.

After completing the program, a majority of the Fellows decide to transition to longer term service through a sending mission agency. PAACS has grown very dependent upon the regular supply of general surgeons and other surgical specialists that have come through this program. Since its inception, 65 surgeons of all types have participated since the program originated in 2004. They have served in 25 hospitals in 22 countries. Over four dozen of those surgeons of various types have served in the PAACS hospitals or hospitals that are reasonably likely to become training programs; ten are functioning as long-term missionary surgeons at PAACS hospitals now and others are at potential programs. They have allowed the beginning of new general surgery and specialty programs both at the old and also at new training sites.

World Medical Missions was founded in 1977 when two surgeon brothers, Drs. Lowell and Richard Furman, approached Franklin Graham and expressed their desire to volunteer for a short-term assignment in a mission hospital during their vacation. World Medical Mission (Samaritan's Purse) would eventually be the main partner to PAACS for the recruitment of short-term surgeons. Some volunteers came under Medical Teams International or the through the agencies associated with the mission hospitals or the missionaries themselves, but the majority have come through World Medical Mission.

Physicians and others serve as short-term volunteers under World Medical Mission for periods extending from weeks to occasionally years. In 1980, less than a dozen physicians served but since then, over 6,200 short-

term medical professionals were sent on over 12,300 trips to mission hospitals. In 2019 alone, 804 trips by medical professionals were made. To emphasize the impact WMM has had on the PAACS hospitals since 1980, World Medical Missions has sent over 2400 short-term anesthesiologists, gastroenterologists, obstetrician-gynecologist and surgeons of all stripes to the PAACS training sites.<sup>1</sup>

But each surgeon was more than just a number. Such volunteers are life-savers to the surgeons of PAACS as they brought relief, knowledge of new techniques, expertise in other surgical specialties and modeled the behavior of a Christian surgeon to the PAACS trainees. They encourage and pray for the trainers and trainees – and they continue when they go home. Many have become regular generous donors to the effort.

The Covid-19 pandemic has severely restricted this effort to support mission hospitals but hopefully, doors are re-opening. Please consider serving with WMM to support the PAACS effort.






