

THE PHENOMENAL GROWTH OF PAACS

Twenty-seven years ago, nine missionary surgeons established the Pan-African Academy of Christian Surgeons. Their lofty goal was to begin to formally train Africa's best Christian surgeons at their mission hospitals. I was privileged to be one of those surgeons. A year before that meeting, I was praying and pleading with God to send me help when I heard him say to me, "You train them!" At the time it seemed impossible. We had no money, no permission from any government or surgical college, no clear curriculum, and no candidates. But we were certain that God would make a way.

"Do not despise these small beginnings, for the Lord rejoices to see the work begin." Zachariah 4:10

There were some who laughed at the idea, but several years earlier Dr. Harold Adolph had already started training African surgeons at Galmi Hospital in Niger. In 1996, most of Africa's 54 nations had medical schools, but fewer than half of Africa's countries were formally training surgeons. Why would they object if surgeons from developed countries started teaching African doctors to become expert surgeons?

I started training my first resident in 1997 and for the next four years added an additional resident each year. In 1999, PAACS managed to open a second program at a Presbyterian hospital in Cameroon, but one year later, the program collapsed for a variety of problems. This was a good training ground for PAACS and taught us many lessons. That same year, Dr. Adolph developed macular degeneration and was forced to return to the US for treatment. Galmi Hospital's training program closed. These were not only "small beginnings," but intensely painful beginnings! But they were foundational.

God was with us every step of the way. Loma Linda University agreed to accredit PAACS academically, providing regular inspections of our training programs, international professorship status for our program directors, and allowing us to put the university's logo on our diplomas. Very soon after this, PAACS became an official "Council" under the Christian Medical and Dental Associations (CMDA), allowing us to use their non-profit status and name recognition.

In 2006, I took on the role of "Director for Africa" and Dr. Bruce Steffes, a surgeon with wide academic experience, took over as the new CEO. That same year, Dr. Keir Thelander joined me at Bongolo Hospital.

The early years of PAACS were like riding a roller coaster, as PAACS opened 11 new training programs and closed four, for a net gain of seven. However, God continued to steer PAACS in the direction it should go. In 2012, the Lord sent Dr. William Wood to be our first Academic Dean and Rev. Stan Key to be our Spiritual Dean. That same year, Dr. Steffes signed an MOU with COSECSA, enabling PAACS residents to sit for COSECSA certification exams.

God continued to bless PAACS and allowed us to expand into more hospitals and countries. That turned out to be just a prelude of what God was going to do with our "small beginnings."


In 2015, Dr. Steffes stepped down as CEO. He brought PAACS from a little-known huddle of mission hospitals training and discipling surgeons in the shadows to a shining and recognized champion of surgical education and the proclamation of Christ's gospel in Africa.

In 2015, Susan Koshy took over from Dr. Steffes as the new PAACS Executive Director. Dr. Keir Thelander took over my role in overseeing the African training programs as the Chief Medical Officer for PAACS. In 2020, PAACS separated amicably from CMDA and became its own stand-alone ministry. At that time, Susan Koshy was named CEO and Keir Thelander was promoted to Executive Vice President. Over the past eight years, under Susan Koshy's leadership, God provided PAACS with everything it has needed to grow into what it is today. Susan, Keir, and the governing board of PAACS have kept us focused on Christ's mission for us, which is to glorify Him by training and discipling African surgeons and related specialists to become Christ-like leaders and servants who provide excellent and compassionate care to those most in need.

As the Psalmist prayed in Psalms 115:1, "Not to us, O Lord, not to us, but to your name goes all the glory for your unfailing love and faithfulness."

Today we can boast in the Lord and say with King David, "God arms me with strength, and he makes my way perfect. He makes me as surefooted as a deer, enabling me to stand on mountain heights." (Psalms 18:32-33) We have sent out 144 graduates who are serving in 22 countries and are currently training 147 residents across 24 programs in 11 countries. May their numbers and witness for Christ transform the hearts and bodies across Africa.

Where is God taking us as we serve Him through PAACS? Nobody knows for sure, but He who created PAACS and sustains it knows, and He invites you to join Him!

Through PAACS and the faculty at AIC Kijabe Hospital and CURE-Kijabe Hospital, Dr. Maluki is steadily becoming a skilled surgeon. Every new day brings fresh challenges and opportunities to refine his skills. His mentors walk beside him guiding his steps, including supporting him emotionally and spiritually, which has even been extended to his family. He recognizes the opportunity he has to impact the junior residents and share his skills and knowledge. He has grown as a leader, mentor, and teacher. After graduation, he looks forward to teaching and impacting more surgical trainees.

Dr. Maluki is thankful to PAACS and its partners for providing much more than surgical training through such a supportive community. The weekly spiritual curriculum has greatly enriched his faith. He has a solid grounding, a growing relationship with Christ, and is confident when faced with questions from unbelievers. 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"Know Thyself," Proverbs, and Emotional Intelligence: Part III


