HARPUR MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

Currently, PAACS has only one training site for all of northern Africa: Harpur Memorial Hospital, in Menouf, Egypt, which also reaches the Middle East. According to the Joshua Project, the 19 countries in this region host a population that exceeds 385 million people, 67% of whom are unreached. Clearly, this program is strategic to the future of Christian hospitals and their important role in reaching Muslims with the love and message of Jesus.

The PAACS Program at Harpur Memorial Hospital is currently in its 8th year. Dr. Paul Lim is the current Program Director and Dr. Shady Fayik, the program's first graduate, is the Assistant Program Director. Dr. Nayer Naiem, also a graduate, is serving as a third faculty surgeon (to be approved at the upcoming PAACS Board meeting.) For a variety of reasons (some of them tragic) since its inception in 2014, Harpur's program has graduated just three surgeons. Previous Program Directors include Dr. Sherif Hanna, now retired in Canada, and Dr. David Thompson, retired and living in Redding, CA.

Harpur's program currently has five residents. This does not include Dr. Armia Samuel, a fourth-year resident who, after a three-month rotation at Mbingo Baptist Hospital, decided to transfer to Mbingo for broader surgical training over the next two years. This is so Dr. Armia and his wife can serve more effectively in the future as international workers in sub-Saharan Africa.

HARPUR MEMORIAL HOSPITAL Reaching Africa and the Middle East





Harpur's General Surgery training program is facing two significant challenges:

- Too few surgical cases to meet PAACS' minimum requirements for its residents. To help resolve this issue, Dr. Lim is hoping to establish one or two satellite surgical clinics near Menouf. Such an effort will require a decision by the hospital's board, which is scheduled to meet in a few weeks.
- An urgent need for an additional, broadly trained general surgeon from the outside. Several surgeons have expressed an interest in joining Harpur's faculty, but have chosen other hospitals.

Currently, Harpur is adding three additional floors to the nursing school building to house faculty for the nursing school and PAACS residents.

Let's keep the PAACS program at Harpur in our prayers and ask God to move on their behalf.



PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT For PAACS Faculty - Present and Future

The PAACS Board of Directors created a Professional Development Committee six years ago with the charge to help our faculty improve their teaching skills. We have done this with online resources and onsite visits discussing faculty development topics. We had planned an in-person Professional Development conference in 2020, but it was cancelled because of COVID. COSECSA has implemented a requirement that surgical faculty of an approved COSECSA training program complete the requirements for a Training of Trainers (TOT) certificate. At present, these requirements include eleven online modules and an in-person 1–2-day training course.

The Professional Development Committee feels that our faculty should complete this training rather than have a separate PAACS course which would duplicate many of the topics.

The recent PAACS strategic plan includes three goals for the Professional Development Committee:

- 1. Plan a Professional Development conference (Planned for June 2022).
- 2. Resident development which would include identifying residents interested in being faculty, providing training for residents to become teachers, and helping to identify faculty opportunities for residents as they complete training.
- 3. Provide faculty development training at a Professional Development Conference as well as online and onsite training.

To fulfill the first goal, a **Professional Development Conference** is planned for June 2022 in Kenya. Topics will emphasize spiritual aspects of being a good teacher, core faculty development topics, and two days dedicated to fulfilling the COSECSA requirements for in-person training to complete the TOT requirements. Three Faculty from each site will be invited to attend the conference.

Spiritual Curriculum

The revision of PAACS Spiritual Curriculum is in its final stage. The Blue, Green, Pink, and Tan books have now been revised. The target date for completion of the Yellow Book is November 2022. About a third of the original material has been replaced with new material.

All of the books have been significantly reformatted for easier navigation. More emphasis has been placed on inductive Bible study. A Leader's Guide is being produced to aid those who are spearheading the teaching times.

While others have helped, a special thanks goes to Rev. Wayne Feigal and Lea Scearce who have greatly assisted the Spiritual Dean in the process of revisions.

Spiritual Retreats

The Veterans Administration medical centers in the USA were early to utilize this opportunity to address long commutes by patients for waits, then brief post-op visits. Telemedicine has been used in Haiti where mountains, bad or no roads, and travel are challenges both physically and financially. Colleagues at Stellenbosch University in Cape Town have just published a scoping review with 250 references re: telemedicine that are applicable to us.

NEW JOINT RESEARCH PROJECT BETWEEN LLU, PAACS, AND COSECSA

An anonymous survey project has been launched jointly between Loma Linda University Department of Surgery and Center for Global Surgery, PAACS, and COSECSA. This survey is to be distributed by email to residents/registrars and faculty of PAACS and COSECSA surgery training programs. An initial survey has been distributed only to PAACS programs to constitute a pilot survey; results from this pilot survey are being compiled now.

The objectives of this project are to 1) assess the burden of cancer care experienced by faculty and trainees in these programs, 2) assess the availability of current resources for cancer care, 3) assess the utilization of known resources for education such as the Global Curriculum for Surgical Oncology, and 4) estimate affordability (out-of-pocket expenses) for patients even when surgical services are available.

The data will be distributed and collected via an anonymous survey in an electronic format without identifiable information. Only residents/registrars or faculty at PAACS or COSECSA Surgery programs in Africa will be included. The survey is sent to all training programs, including sub-specialty programs. Investigators include surgeons at LLU and PAACS general surgery program at Tenwek Hospital, Kenya.

It is expected that this survey will provide necessary data to emphasize the need for improving surgical oncology training opportunities within current training programs and broaden the awareness of surgical oncology resources that are currently available but underutilized.
