PAACS 30TH ANNIVERSARY

Has it already been thirty years since PAACS started? Some of today's PAACS residents weren't even born in 1996, and for them 1996 is ancient history! Back then Archbishop Desmond Tutu was holding hearings in Pretoria to investigate apartheid-era human rights violations, and an uprising in eastern DRC backed by Rwanda and Uganda sought to oust the DRC's dictator, Mobutu Sese Seko. That same year Nigeria's Olympic football team won the gold medal in Atlanta, defeating Argentina 3-2, and the Democratic Republic of Congo was called Zaire. That same year, the Christian Medical and Dental Association held its 65th Annual General Meeting in Bamako, Mali. The ratio of trained surgeons to population was one per 200,000—one-fifteenth of the ratio in the United States and Europe. So, it's no surprise that in February of 1996, a meeting of tired missionary surgeons from hospitals around Africa, several academic surgeons from the U.S., and a CMDA representative went completely unnoticed by the world. But God was there too, and he certainly noticed!

To me it seems like yesterday when one day as I was praying to God—complaining might be a better word—and griping that He didn't seem to be hearing my plea to send another surgeon to help me. I had prayed that prayer for two years, and God hadn't done what I asked. But on that day as I was praying, I heard in my heart the words, "You train them, David!" My immediate reaction was that it was a ridiculous random thought, so I kept pleading with God. Almost immediately those same words came again, only more forcefully: "You train them, David!" My initial answer to God was, "How? I am already working myself to exhaustion as the only surgeon in south Gabon! How can I add that to my plate?" God didn't answer. Eventually I began asking Him to show me how I could train surgeons, and over the next six months I realized that I already had the answer: train them exactly as I was trained over five years, including use the same textbooks and examinations, and teach them gradually in the operating room and on postoperative rounds. What would be different would be discipling my residents in God's Word during their five years of training. Looking back on it all, I can only say, "It was God's idea, and he made it possible!"

How do I know that? Because I was there at the Brackenhurst Conference when in faith ten or so missionary surgeons and visiting academic surgeons who were teaching at the conference bowed in prayer and asked God to help us do the impossible and establish surgical residency programs in our hospitals! At the time, none of us missionary surgeons had academic credentials, our hospitals had no funding to build housing for residents or support them, and some expressed serious doubt that any of Africa's governments or universities would recognize or even tolerate our surgical training programs. But we had God on our side, and the sobering awareness that if we did not succeed, most of our hospitals would probably disappear within a decade or two after we grew old and retired.

Of course, we were not the only heroes in the founding of PAACS, and not the only ones who believed that God could do the impossible. The first residents to sign up to be trained for five years of their lives in our unimpressive hospitals were the first residents to volunteer! Dr. Paolo Baltazar was the first, and he was encouraged by Dr. Bob Foster, one of Africa's best-known missionary surgeons. During his decades of service in Angola, he established not just one, but several mission hospitals, including the CEML hospital in Lubango. Dr. Stanley Quanbeck, a missionary surgeon from Madagascar who attended some of our formative PAACS meetings at the Brackenhurst Conference encouraged one of his protégés, Dr. Harison Rasamimanana, to apply to be our second resident. Both of these first graduate surgeons finished in 2002 and are still serving at Christian hospitals in their home countries. Their example of faith encouraged others to apply, and the rest, as we say, is history!

From the beginning to the present, the gracious and merciful hand of God has blessed PAACS, and on all of us who have trusted Him and served Him in obedience.

PAACS had a strong presence at the WACS meeting in Accra, Ghana, February 8-12. As a preconference ALL-SAFE, a PAACS facilitated program for laparoscopic training, hosted about 20 surgical residents for a one-day training in laparoscopic surgery and simulation. The opening ceremonies were a wonderful event to hear from the president of Ghana and other surgical and health leaders in Ghana. A few PAACS grads, PAACS residents, and faculty were in attendance and presented papers on their experience in laparoscopic surgery among other topics. PAACS graduate, Dr. Blessing Ngam from Mbingo spoke on laparoscopic training simulation and implementation. PAACS EVP, Keir Thelander, presented on PAACS as an organization and its impact in Africa, giving a challenge to broaden the rural-based training of surgeons. Dr. Aminat, 5th year resident from Galmi, presented her work on bowel perforation exclusive of typhoid perforations. The conference was highlighted by the awarding of certificates to the membership and fellowship levels with PAACS graduate Dr. Jerry Brown, from Mbingo now in Liberia, becoming a WACS fellow by election. Some meetings were held with WACS leadership to discuss pathways to recognition. Pray with us that the Lord will open these doors for our trainees and graduates.



Visit to EP Church Mission Hospital of the International Health and Development Network

On Thursday PAACS EVP and Academic Dean Emeritus, John Tarpley, made the long journey to almost the Togo border to visit a hospital looking to have a PAACS training site. Dr. Edem Agamah was our host as he is the founder and visionary as well as director of the hospital. Dr. Agamah began this work in 1996 (their 30th anniversary just like PAACS!!!) He has made almost 50 trips since that inception with the facility now growing to 100 beds, developing a surgical service, and a growing OB/GYN service. This area of Ghana is impacted greatly by syncretism as spirit worship is prevalent. PAACS looks forward to seeing the growth, development, and prayerfully eventual beginning of PAACS training in Ghana. Prayers are needed for guidance, direction, and open doors.



MALAMULO OUTREACH

For the last several years I have felt impressed that our program needed to get involved with outreach to the community surrounding our hospital. Through a series of talks with our local community leaders and traditional authority, God opened the doors for us to be able to start this project in January 2026. We were blessed to combine our outreach with the dental team at the village of Magwira which is a 20-minute drive from the hospital. The surgical team who went included myself, Dr. Matthew Kolleh (PGY5), Dr. Joela Hayibor (PGY2) and our translator Maxwell. During our time at the village health center, we were able to discuss a number of topics such as BPH, prostate cancer, gastritis, and esophageal cancer. A crowd of approximately 70-80 people were in attendance, and they had many insightful questions. It was an incredible experience to go to our patient's "home" to discuss some of these common surgical conditions, and we were also able to screen several of them to come to the hospital for further care. We pray that God continues to bless these outreaches as we go on a monthly basis into the community.

After years of trying to bring the Saline Process program to Mbingo Hospital Cameroon, the first in-person course was held Feb 13-14, 2026. Two homegrown trainers, Drs. Chukwuemeka Nwegbu and Laurie Elit led the training.

Attending were 20 residents, faculty, chaplains and hospital administrators. The training did not come without certain distractions. Emeka who played John in John's journey was literally on a crutch due to the flare of a recent knee injury. A noted highlight of the training was the mixture of health personnel and chaplains in the small groups. It gave them an appreciation of each other's role in the spiritual journey of the patient. A vision was birthed for sharing the gospel not just one on one with patients at Mbingo but to train all 500 hospital staff at this site and ultimately at the 10 other Cameroon Baptist Convention Healthcare facilities.

I had the pleasure of visiting Kijabe, Kenya Feb 4-13, 2026.

My primary purpose was to support the work of the Anesthesiology Department while Dr. Matt Kynes is on home assignment in the US. An additional goal was to work with some of the 9 anesthesiology residents, most of whom I joined in clinical care, educational programs and bible study. I was delighted to work along-side Dr. Eunice Kageha and Dr. Rebecca Dufe, the first two graduates of the PAACS Anesthesiology residency program, who are now consultants in Anesthesiology at Kijabe and hopefully soon-to-be faculty members for the PAACS Anesthesiology residency program. They were members of the first class of graduates of the CANECSA curriculum, and Dr. Eunice received an award for the highest scoring candidate of all the CANECSA graduates from 12 different countries!

In addition to supporting the residents, anesthesiologists and Dr. Greg Sund, I had the pleasure of meeting and working with several PAACS surgical residents and consultants. I spent time supporting the new neurosurgery program and also met with other local champions at Kijabe including David Shirk, ED of Friends of Kijabe and Dr. Britney Grayson, Chief Medical Officer of Bethany Kids. Work on the new housing construction project for residents is underway, and the first phase is projected to be completed by the end of 2026.

At the weekly Chapel program, I learned that in 2025 Kijabe had a total of 67 residents and 224 visiting learners and there were almost 10,000 surgical procedures performed at Kijabe hospital!

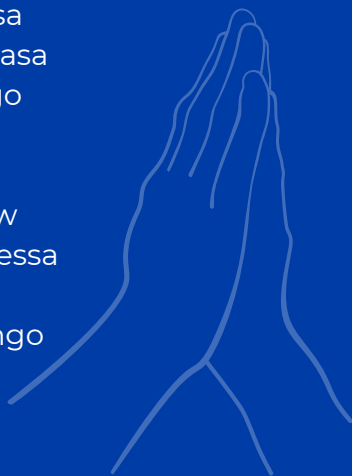
