- We also took a moment to honor Dr. Bruce Steffes and his wife, Micky, for their outstanding long-term contributions and impact to the PAACS community.

Board of Directors Update:

- The PAACS Board met on October 12th in a Closed Session to discuss critical topics such as finances, governance, and the 2023-24 audit. They also held philosophical discussions regarding hosting programs in mission vs. non-mission hospitals. In addition, they further discussed the role of research within PAACS programs.
- Updates on our five-year strategic plan and other major projects were also shared.
- Board elections brought fresh enthusiasm, with 7 members elected or re-elected, ready to continue driving our mission forward.

Saturday Session:

- Our session, "Embracing the Call: Serving PAACS Through Long and Short-Term Missions," began with a panel moderated by Dr. Jim Smith, Joanna Thelander, Dr. Jeshiah Thiessen, and PAACS graduate Dr. Sam Fabiano.
- Dr. Dembele presented how visiting faculty can contribute to resident training.

PAACS VISIT TO MAHAJANGA: CELEBRATING 40 YEARS OF MAHAJANGA MEDICAL SCHOOL

Recently, some of our PAACS Mandritsara team had the opportunity to attend the scientific congress celebrating the 40th anniversary of the Mahajanga Medical School. After a long journey—around 20 hours on the road across more than 500 kilometers—we arrived in Mahajanga. The event was a gathering of over 200 doctors and medical students from across Madagascar, and we were honored to be one of the event sponsors. The Dean, a committed Christian, was incredibly supportive of PAACS and made it cl



Christian, was incredibly supportive of PAACS and made it clear to the delegates how important our program is for the future of surgical training in the country. He has expressed a strong desire to deepen our relationship, which we're praying will bear fruit.



Dr. Marco gave a fascinating talk on cow horn injuries—an all too common trauma in our region—while Dr. Toavina, a first-year resident, presented research on ureteric reimplantation for schistosomiasis. I had the chance to speak more generally about the PAACS program, and we also shared a few words from Matthew's Gospel about Jesus seeing the crowds, "like sheep without a shepherd", and responding to them in his compassion by teaching them and healing their diseases. It was a privilege to not only discuss our work but also speak about the heart of Christ's heart for the lost. We're praying that there might have been future PAACS trainees in that room!



It was an excellent chance to build connections, and we're especially encouraged by the possibility of a delegation from Mahajanga visiting Mandritsara soon. We're grateful for these opportunities to strengthen ties and are hopeful for what God might do through this growing relationship.

WORK IS NOT A FOUR-LETTER WORD - PART 2

The phrases "pray and work" (or "pray and labor"; Latin: *ora et labora*) and to work is to pray (*laborare est orare*) refer to the monastic practice of working and praying, generally associated with its use in the Rule of Saint Benedict. (Ora et labora - Wikipedia) We are enjoined "to work as unto the Lord" (Col 3:23). A contention of Martin Luther (1483-1546) with the book of James, which




3:23). A contention of Martin Luther (1483-1546) with the book of James, which he called a "strawy epistle", evolved in part from his focus on *solo fido* or "faith alone" in his opposition to "works righteousness." James is a favorite book of the New Testament for me with its wisdom literature-like short aphorisms and Proverbs-like instructions. I like the resolution: "It is not faith; it is not works; it is faith that works."

In Jesus' encounter with the woman at the well, the section concludes with Jesus' observation: "The fields are white unto harvest." (John 4:35) The health care needs in Sub-Saharan Africa are nigh overwhelming on all fronts, whether care providers, medicines, vaccines, clean water, enough food, etc. We need to be at work but not workaholics. In Nigeria in the late 1970s, a senior missionary advised me: "Train and equip ten to do the work, not try to do the work of ten." The challenge is a marathon, not a sprint.

In my welcome to incoming first year surgical residents to Vanderbilt in the two decades 1995-2014, I reminded them they are physical, emotional, psychological, spiritual beings with needs like hydration, food, exercise, sleep, social interactions, friendship, and love. It was important "to hoe one's spiritual garden" and to water one's friendships lest they become arid and die. Jessica Grose in her New York Times column of 28.06.23 observed: "Almost everyone needs community to flourish." What is your community or communities?

Forty years later, accelerated by the COVID pandemic and endorsed in this digital era with nigh universal attachments to our devices and social media, we are morphing into atomistic individuals with a loss of personal interaction and community formerly provided by on-site work rather than working from home, the decline in church attendance, and fewer social gatherings. This century we hear much about wellness and work-life balance. See the Table below.
